Attendance is Critical to Student Learning!

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Did you Know...

*Over 7 million (1 in 7) U.S. students miss nearly a month of school each year.

***CHRONIC ABSENTEEISM** is considered when a student misses 18 days (10% of the school year) of school or more. Please speak to administration if your child has a medical condition that impacts their attendance.

*Poor attendance can influence whether children read proficiently by the end of third grade or be held back. Students with high attendance risk in kindergarten and/or first grade scored an average of 50 points lower on third-grade ELA tests.

*Students with strong attendance had significantly higher scores on the third-grade ELA test; when absences increased, the likelihood of performing at grade level on both ELA and math tests decreased.

*By 6th grade, chronic absence becomes a leading indicator that a student will drop out of high school.

*When students improve their attendance rates, they improve their academic prospects and chances of graduating.

*Funding for schools in Arizona is based on daily attendance rates.
